Loyola Press Sunday Family Connections

Gospel Reading
Matthew 13:1-23



Jesus teaches that the kingdom of heaven is like the seed sown on good soil.

Today’s Gospel reminds us that for the Word of God to take root in us and bear abundant fruit, we must strive to be like good soil. Families, in particular, have the responsibility to “prepare the soil” so that the seeds of God’s Word can grow strong. There are many ways families do this: family traditions that celebrate the faith, prayer and Scripture reading, and instruction in the faith. In these ways, parents fulfill the promises they made at their children’s Baptism.

Gather as a family and reflect together on the Sacrament of Baptism. Share each child’s Baptism story, showing any photos that were taken. If you have your child’s Baptismal candle or gown, share those as well. Recall together that one of the promises parents make at their children’s Baptism is to raise them in the practice of our faith. Discuss the importance of this promise for your family. Then, read today’s Gospel together, Matthew 13:1-23. Reflect together on how your family practices the faith (daily prayer, attending Mass, religious instruction, etc.). Remind each other that we do these things as a family so that the Word of God may take root in our lives and bear abundant fruit. Conclude with a prayer together, reciting Psalm 65.

Have you been wondering if you are being called to active ministry in our church?

There is training for every ministry ad you will have opportunities to practice. It's normal to be nervous, its something new, important and beautiful. Take a chance.

Sacristan arrives early to prepare the altar for Mass. This ministry involves setting the books for the Mass, preparing the Chalice, and making sure all items needed for Mass are in place. After mass, the same items are put away properly.

Extraordinary Minister (EM) this ministry is commissioned to assist the priest in distributing communion

Lector this includes reading the payer before Mass, first and second reading and prayers of the faithful.

Usher this ministry involves coming in early to greet people as they enter the church, taking care of the collection and helping people find seating as needed during large masses.

Alter Server assists the priests in procession and during Mass, Must be 7 yrs old or older and have made your first communion. Yes, Adults you are welcome too.

Homebound Minister This ministry takes communion to the sick and homebound. Generally, it could be just 1 or 2 persons that you would take communion to. There is a guided script to help and training . Having people who live in different part of the parish is helpful.

Religious Education This ministry teaches or supports teachers in religious education of parish children to grow in faith, understanding, and love preparing them to receive the sacraments and to build a future with Christ at the center of their heart.

Youth Ministy There currently isn't an active ministry, but if you have this call maybe something in th future is possible.

Today's Reflection
Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year A)
Sunday July 12, 2026

A Longing for God’s Goodness

The readings for this coming Sunday in midsummer reflect the beauties of the earth, its golden harvests, its wondrous spring, its delicate birds, beasts, mountains, hills, and plains. Endless wonder for those whose eyes can see.

The Jesuit poet Hopkins was so filled with the beauty of the world that he can express it here, in the poem entitled “Mottled Beauty.”

Glory to God for mottled things:
For skies two-colored like a striped cow;
For pink spots all dotted upon the swimming trout;
Cascades the color of fresh coal; wings of finches;
Path traced and fragmented: sheepfold, fallow, and plow;
And all trades, their tools and harnesses.

All things contrary, original, scarce, strange;
Everything that is fickle, speckled (who knows how?)
Swiftly, slowly; sweet, sour; dazzling, dim;
He brings forth whose beauty is unchanging:
Praise Him.

I admit that some of the language is unusual. But if you take the time to contemplate these glorious images, you will come to love our ever-evolving blue planet like one who bathes in the gentle ocean tide. Everything is lush, everything is precious.

The Lord uses this ebb and flow of the seasons in the First Reading to show how His visceral love for the earth works. Just as rain and snow come to the earth, He says, so does the word of God, which then returns to the heavens when it has fulfilled its purpose of watering. It does not return until it has moistened and nourished the life in every creature that will receive it. A fruitful harvest, the Psalm says.

Saint Paul speaks of all creation groaning in the pains of childbirth even now (Second Reading). Human beings also groan inwardly like seeds sprouting and pushing their way through barren soil, only to grow into leafy trees reaching for the light of Christ.

Can these profound images apply to you and me? How fertile is our own soil? God pours his grace into it constantly. Do we groan and long for God’s goodness, which is ready to be poured out upon us? Do we dedicate time each day to allowing love into our lives? Or do we listen on Sunday, perhaps with some interest, but then forget everything by Monday? Or do we simply not listen at all?

Jesus lists several things we might need to correct in order to accept the gifts he has prepared for us. We might be shallow soil, he says. Or rocky soil. Weeds might choke us. How discouraging! Should I pretend to be fertile soil, even though I know my shallowness? No. I must be fully myself and let God do the rest.

The great Indian poet Tagore expressed it this way:
“The cloud stood humbly in a corner of the sky.
Morning crowned it with splendor.”

Let us be humble! Let us join in the constant renewal of all earthly things! Let us open our leaves! Let us let in the sun!
